## CONNECTING THE BLOCKS

In an effort to promote pedestrian movement and a sense of place, the City of Fort Lauderdale launched the Connecting the Blocks Painted Intersection Project in late spring. Today, brilliant bands of color by Florida artist Cecilia Lueza brings new life to the Las Olas intersections of SE First Avenue and SE Second Avenue, and a third -SE Third Avenue - is planned for October 4. Each intersection



features a different design, and all are vibrant and reflect the spirit of the downtown area. In addition to the aesthetic update, the project also includes safety improvements, such as the installation of well-defined crosswalks, ramp upgrades, sidewalk enhancements and solarpowered flashing beacons. Volunteers are welcome for the October 4 event, which kicks off at 9 a.m. at Las Olas and SE Third Avenue.

# Beneath the Surface: What Rests Inside an Architect?

Architecture *is* one of the seven arts, a fact that is frequently forgotten. For architects, though, enjoying the fruits of their labor takes infinite patience. Guiding a project from abstraction to tangible structure can take years, sometimes decades. Understandably, then, the restless artist within often yearns for other creative outlets, and gravitating to the fine arts is entirely natural.

Highlighting the varied artistic output of eight architects was the impetus for the exhibition "Beneath the Surface: What Rests Inside an Architect?" shown October 9 to 22, 2014, at Fort Lauderdale's Forré & Co. Fine Art Gallery and sponsored by the Urban Land Institute, *Tropic* Magazine and organized by Adept Strategy & Public Relations.

Based in South Florida and beyond, the participants included locals Victor Alvarez, Margi Nothard, Thorn Grafton, Peter Stromberg, Nathan VanDeman, and Don Singer, as well as Jose Grinberg from Mexico and Steven Davis from New York City. Works both personal and professional were on display: an eclectic array of paintings, sculpture, photographs, even furniture, plus models, renderings, and images of finished structures. The pieces that literally delved "beneath the surface," however, had to be Davis's model and renderings of the National September 11 Memorial Museum. His firm, Davis Brody Bond, was the lead architect of the controversial site located 70 feet below ground.
